ST MARY'S VILLA PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

St Mary's Villa has been a work of St Mary's Parish for the past 37 year. It has always enjoyed an excellent reputation for the care that it provides to the residents. However, recent changes to Commonwealth Government regulations have placed additional administrative demands on Aged Care facilities.

It has become clear that smaller stand-alone facilities, like St Mary's Villa, will need significant support if they are to meet those demands in the future.

A review of the needs of St Mary's Villa has concluded that the best way to secure its long-term future is for the Villa to become part of a larger Catholic Aged Care group.

ADVENT – WAITING IN HOPE



The Season of Advent opens the Church's liturgical year. The English word "advent" comes from the Latin "adventus" which literally means "coming". In pagan Rome "adventus" was the celebration of the anniversary of the coming of the Emperor.

The early Christians took over the term and used it for the time of preparation for Christmas when they celebrated the first coming of Christ. That remains the focus of the last week of Advent.

However, the season begins by looking to the future, not to Christmas but to the second coming of Christ in glory. In that sense the first weeks of Advent continue the focus of the last Sunday of the Church's year, the feast of Christ the King.

By the end of the fourth century, as the Christmas season became established in Spain and Gaul, Advent emerged as a time of preparation for those who were to be baptized on the feast of the Epiphany and so it came to be seen as a "second Lent".

At one time it extended for 40 days from the feast of St Martin (11 November) to the Epiphany (6 January) leading to the popular name of "St Martin's Lent".

The traditional use of purple or violet vestments recalls that connection with Lent. But Advent is not a penitential season. At St Mary's, we distinguish the different seasons by using blue-purple vestments for Advent and red-purple vestments for Lent.

In Rome the season of Advent did not become established until the middle of the sixth century. By then the link with a time of preparation for Baptism had diminished as had the earlier penitential practices. Pope Gregory the Great (591-604) reduced Advent to four Sundays to make a clear distinction between Advent and Lent.

In Advent we continue to use Alleluia as our Gospel acclamation, but the *Gloria* is not said or sung. It is omitted so that it may resound with greater freshness at Christmas. Popular devotions such as the Advent wreath give a focus to our waiting in hope for the coming of Christ.

CLIMATE CHANGE: World leaders gathered over the past two weeks in Egypt for COP 27, the United Nations Conference of the Parties on climate change. They will also gather in Canada in December for the Conference of the Parties on biodiversity (COP 15).

In his Message for the **2022 World Day of Prayer for Care of Creation**, Pope Francis urged world leaders to commit to ambitious plans at the COP 27 to achieve the goal of keeping global temperature rise to 1.5 degrees Celsius. He also urged leaders gathering at the COP 15 to make new multilateral agreements to halt the alarming increases in destruction of ecosystems and extinction of species.

The Holy Father reminds us that the Gospel calls us to repentance, to a new relationship with God and a different relationship with others and with all of creation. This conversion of heart will lead us to take action personally, but also communally to care for our common home.



These two meetings present another opportunity for world leaders to agree on actions which will address the twin crises of climate change and loss of biodiversity.

They also present us with an opportunity as people of faith to join with others in calling for effective action to deal with these immense ecological crises.

THE LETTER: The Feast of St Francis of Assisi (4 October) saw the world premiere at the Vatican of the documentary film **The Letter: A Message For Our Earth**. Based on Pope Francis' 2015 encyclical letter, "Laudato Si', on Care for Our Common Home" the film was made in partnership with the Laudato Si' Movement, the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development and the Dicastery for Communication.

It explores the consequences of climate change through the voices of the poor, young people, indigenous peoples and others who met with Pope Francis last year. The film is streaming for free at theletterfilm.org and **YouTube Originals**.

HOW DO I BECOME A CATHOLIC? Adults who have not been baptized and wish to become part of the community of the Catholic Church receive the Sacraments of Christian Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) in the **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults** (RCIA).

The RCIA presumes that there is an extended period of formation and preparation, usually leading to the celebration of Baptism at Easter.

Baptised members of other Christian Churches who wish to become members of the Catholic Church do so through **Reception into Full Communion**.

JESUIT REFUGEE SERVICE FOODBANK

HERITAGE SIGNS: St Mary's Parish commissioned five heritage signs to mark the sesquicentenary of the parish in 2020.



The First Church 1845

The signs are located in the Church Forecourt and recall the historical parish buildings that once existed on the parish site: the first church (1845), the second church (1874), the presbytery (1882), the first school building (1894) and the convent (1898). Each sign has been placed close to the original location of that building.

The sign near the Parramatta Road gates also reminds us that prior to European settlement, the Burwood-Concord district was occupied by the Wangal clan. They called themselves the Eora, meaning 'the people' and they had been living in the Sydney area for at least 10,000 years.

The British colony of New South Wales was established in January 1788 with the arrival of the First Fleet. In late 1788 a small settlement was established at Parramatta and by 1791 a bush track had been built between Sydney and Parramatta that became what is now Parramatta Road.

In 1793 some free settlers received grants in the area then named Liberty Plains. In that same year, land grants were made to six non-commissioned officers in the district that came to be known as Concord.

St Mary's Church Concord



The painting of the Blessed Virgin Mary that is the dominant image of Mary in the church is a copy of *The Immaculate Virgin of Los Venerables* painted by the Spanish artist Bartolome Esteban Murillo (1618-1682) in about 1678.

It is believed that the original painting was commissioned from Bartolomé Esteban Murillo by Justino de Neve, who was ecclesiastical president of the *Hospital de los Venerables* in Seville. He later donated it to the chapel at the hospital. The original painting is now in the Prado Museum in Madrid

The title of *Immaculate Virgin* reflects the belief that Mary was without sin from the first moment of her being. Although it was only officially declared a dogma of the Church in 1854, belief in the Immaculate Conception of Mary had been a popular devotion in Spain since the 16th century.

In this painting Murillo combined two different iconographic traditions: the Immaculate Conception and the Assumption. Although the Assumption of Mary was only declared to be a dogma in 1950, it too had been a popular devotion for many centuries.

St Mary's Villa Concord – Planning for the Future

St Mary's Villa, a residential aged care facility, is a work of St Mary's Parish Concord. It opened in 1985 at 38 Burton Street Concord and then in 2010 it was relocated to a new building on the parish site at 56 Burton Street. St Mary's Villa has been operated by St Mary's Parish for the past 37 years.

When reforms were introduced by the Commonwealth Government in the 1997 Aged Care Act, it became necessary for an aged care provider to be a body corporate in civil law. To comply with the 1997 Act, the Archdiocese of Sydney established the Trustees of Catholic Aged Care Sydney (TCACS) who became the approved provider under the Aged Care Act for all the parish operated residential aged care facilities in the Archdiocese of Sydney.

By 2019, St Mary's Villa was the only remaining parish operated facility under TCACS. It was also becoming apparent that to meet increasing government regulations, St Mary's Villa needed additional management support. Unfortunately, the COVID pandemic interrupted the plan to establish a management support agreement with a larger Catholic aged care group.

While St Mary's Villa continues to offer excellent care for its residents, the new Commonwealth Government Aged Care Act, introduced in the 2021, places additional administrative demands on all aged care facilities.

The new aged care standards have introduced important reforms. However, it has also become clear that smaller stand-alone residential facilities, such as St Mary's Villa, will find it challenging to meet those standards without additional support systems.

The St Mary's Parish Villa Advisory Committee and the Trustees of Catholic Aged Care Sydney have been carefully reviewing the needs of St Mary's Villa.

While St Mary's Villa will continue to operate on the parish site and will always be associated with St Mary's Parish, we have accepted that it needs to become part of a larger Catholic Aged Care group.

We believe that the best way we can secure the long-term future of St Mary's Villa is to seek an appropriate approved provider, who is able to provide the resources that will be needed to care for the frail aged members of our community.

TCACS continues to be the current approved provider for St Mary's Villa and any change will require the prior approval of the Archbishop of Sydney and of the Parish Priest of St Mary's Parish.

It is presumed that no further information will be available until early 2023.
